January

Birthstone – Garnet
Flower – Carnation
Sign: Capricorn – Dec. 23 – Jan. 20
Element – Earth
Attributes – Ambitious, practical, prudent

January was named for the Roman god Janus. He was the protector of gates and doorways. Janus is depicted with two faces, one looking into the past and the other one looking into the future.

So this is a good month to contemplate the previous year and what we learned in order to create a better future.

In Rome, gilded nuts or coins marked the start of the new year.

In Persia, eggs, the symbol of fertility were exchanged.

In Egypt, earthenware flasks were traded.

In Scotland, silverware was exchanged for good luck.

In ancient Thailand, guns were fired to frighten off demons.

In China, firecrackers were used to stop the forces of darkness.

In early American Colonies, the sounds of pistols rang through the air.

In Italy, church bells peal.

In North America, sirens sound and party horns get played.

In Ireland, pastries called Bannocks get eaten.

In India and Pakistan, rice gets eaten for the promise of prosperity.

In Switzerland, dollops of whipped cream are eaten, symbolizing richness for the year to come.

Element – Air
Attributes – humanitarian, original, inventive

February was named after the Roman Februalia, which was a month long festival of purification and atonement. The Latin word februa means "to cleanse".

So this is a good month to think about everything from the past that we do not want to take into our future.

Groundhog Day falls on February 2nd and traditionally marks the midpoint between the winter solstice and spring equinox. According to legend, if a groundhog sees its shadow on this day, there will be six more weeks of winter; if it doesn't then spring is right around the corner. France and England looked to the bear; Germany looked to the Badger.

April

April was named from the Latin word aperio, which means "to open or to bud". This is obvious because it is the month that plants begin to grow. So this is a good month to initiate new ideas and goals.

It is also the time of Easter. The origin of the word "Easter" seems to have been derived from the Anglo-Saxon dawn goddess Eostre, whose feast was celebrated in Spring. Why the Easter Bunny? Because the bunny is the Egyptian symbol of fertility.

As well, Easter is a movable feast and does not have a fixed date. However, it is always on a Sunday because it celebrates Christ's resurrection.

May was named for the Roman goddess Maia. Maia was the goddess who oversaw the growth of plants and flowers. It is also named from the Latin word maiores, which means 'elders'. It was the month that elders were officially celebrated. The Greeks paid homage to Cybele, the mother figure of their gods. The Romans dedicated an annual spring festival to the mother of their gods.

In 1905, after her mother died, Anna Jarvis wished to memorialize her life and started campaigning for a national day to honor all mothers. In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill designating the second Sunday in May as a legal holiday to be called "Mothers Day". So this is the month to honor our mothers, whether it be ours, someone else's or Mother Earth.

June

Sign – Gemini – May 22 – June 22
Element – Air
Attributes – Versatile, communicative, lively

June was named for the Roman goddess Juno. Juno was the patroness of marriage and the well-being of women. This is clear because so many marriages take place in June. June is also from the Latin word juvenis, which means "young people".

So this is a good month to think of our feminine side, whether we be man or woman. It is also the time to focus on our inner child and have some fun.

June is also the time of the summer solstice. The word solstice comes from the Latin words for sun and to stand still. Some believe that Stonehenge, which was built in 2500 BCE in England, was built to help establish when the solstice would occur. July

In 1789, President George Washington called on the people to acknowledge God for giving them an opportunity to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness. He did this by devoting a day of thanks and prayer, which is always the last Thursday of November. It is now a federal holiday.

December was named from the Latin word decem. Decem means ten. Therefore, in the early Roman calendar, December was the tenth month.
